


Attention All Knights of Columbus June 28 Meeting Information

### Someone is Watching and Wondering



Do you know what this is? It is a structure from ancient Ephesus, believed to be the home of the disciple John, and the place where Mary spent her

final years on earth. It doesn't look much like our houses today, and even less like a church. Yet, we know the first century Christians gathered in homes, just like this one, to pray together, and to study writings carried to them by Christian teachers like Paul. On "the day named for the sun" they gathered for worship and the breaking of bread. These early Christians struggled to live their faith in the face of opposition from friends, and threats of arrest by the Roman authorities. After all, their baptism and communion was in direct conflict with the Roman religion, which was based on worship of the emperor, Domitian, who had decreed that he was to be called "Our Lord and Our God." Although the Christians in Ephesus made up less than five percent of the population, they were a threat to the empire. Their belief that Jesus was the Son of God, who died for their sins, and rose from the dead to become Lord of the Universe, was viewed as treasonous, and punishable by death. Yet they continue to faithfully live their beliefs within communities, sharing and caring for one another. Are there similarities between we 21st century Christians, and our ancestral siblings?

At the beginning of Lumen Gentium, the Second Vatican Council's constitution on the Church, we read: "the church, in Christ is a sacrament. . .both a sign and an instrument of intimate union with God and the entire human race." In Luke's gospel, when a teacher of the law asked Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus replied by asking how the teacher understood the law. The teacher's answer: "You should love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all you being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." Jesus then said, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live." Given these two passages, it seems very evident that as believers in Christ Jesus we, who are the church, show love of God through our oneness and humanness. What I mean is that at baptism, we become children of God, united with Christ as brothers and sisters, and led by the Holy Spirit. We become a people united by a common heritage, created in love by God, assembled in the name of Jesus, and bound together in the Spirit. As hearers of His word, we become flesh in Christ and live in the Reign of God. Christ plants the seed within our hearts, that we might develop an inner spiritual energy to take up His work, and continue to spread His message to the world. We are called to love, forgive, and care for one another. Jesus tells us to become servants, and to act unselfishly, without expecting any return for our actions. Our lives may seem as different from the early Christians as there homes and church dwellings, but the message of community, love and service is the same. Although most of us will not face death because we practice the faith, we may be criticized for not being "with it" culturally. In reality Jesus' message calls us to walk to the beat of a different drum, to step outside ourselves, and live through Him. Your sister in Christ, Sandy Gagnon

The first June Father's Day was celebrated on 19th June, 1908, in Spokane, WA, at the Spokane YMCA. Politician and orator, William Jennings Bryan appreciated the concept immediately and began extending his support widely. Father's Day was then initiated by President Woodrow Wilson, who was the first U.S. President to celebrate it on June 1916, a party his family hosted. President Calvin Coolidge declared it a national holiday in 1924. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson, by official order, made Father's Day a holiday to be celebrated on the third Sunday of June. The holiday was not formally considered until 1972, when it was officially acknowledged by a Congressional Act setting it permanently on the third Sunday in June all over the nation.



Cost is \$20 per child, which includes their t-shirt, music cd and all the fun stuff for the week. VBS is open to children from those 3 years old by 8/1/15 to those entering the 5th grade next fall.

#### Progress Report Urban Ranger Sponsorship

We collected over \$2,000 in cash donations for the Urban Ranger Program through our Soup Suppers, but that's not the only way our parish is supporting this ministry that provides mentors, encourages good grades, fosters service to the community done by the teens, and makes a difference in the lives of these at-risk young men. Members of our Altar Society has made sandwich lunches for the teams of young men who will be heading out on their community service projects.

These young men will be mowing lawns and doing cleanup and repair work all over the inner city – making vacant lots safer and helping elderly folks who are no longer able.
