

From the Pastor's Pen

Summertime is a great time for family reunions and get togethers. And what family get-together is not complete without food or potluck. Over the years as I've attended both my own family gettogethers and been invited to join others, it is always interesting to see the different types of food as well as the different quantities. For whatever reason, it seems the fewer the number, the more pots of food on the table, and larger crowds fewer dishes. But someway, somehow, there always seems to be just enough food for everyone. Maybe it's because each family knows just how much food the family will eat or maybe someone is just cheap and knows that someone else in the family will bring enough. Whatever the reason, it just works out.

However, I do recall one meal that was served that we were scrounging to find enough food. It happened to be one night at the St. James Food Kitchen. This was while I was a student at Rockhurst and in formation. We were part of the Tuesday night crew. We usually had more than enough food but that night the cook left us short. Or maybe we had a larger than usual crowd. About halfway through the night we noticed we were running short and not going to make it to the end. Br. Robert kept mumbling, "Loaves and fishes, loaves and fishes." At one point we realized "loaves and fishes" wasn't going to help, so back to the pantry I went to find anything I could to heat up. I found some cans of fruit as well as white label cans of "Pork." So to the stove I went. As I heated the pork, I noticed a layer of fat and juices coming to the top. I decided to drain the pork so it could be served. One of the quests noticed what I was doing and yelled, "Don't pour that off! That's all the flavor!!!" Ok, I thought, but it just wasn't very appetizing. As we got it to the serving line, he said again, "I know, it may not look the greatest, but it's food and we are hungry!" And so we served it to finish out the night.

Sometimes we are just hungry and we just need something to eat regardless of how appetizing the food may look. Other times, we may sit down to a beautifully set table and the food looks and smells truly amazing. It is truly a dining experience. When we sit down together to share a meal, do we just notice the food on the plate before us or do we truly share in the dining experience with those at table with us?

As we share today this Eucharist, may the bread we break and the cup we share truly be a dining experience.

Message from Bishop Johnston

One of the most fulfilling things in life is to be a part of something great with others. As we read the Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles, we often notice the spirit of joy, confidence, and boldness with which the disciples lived and acted. They knew Jesus and they had received the Holy Spirit which filled them with Christ and his power.

I believe this is also what Christ wants to do in us now. God is pleased when we are "of one heart and mind" for that is a sign of the Holy Spirit's action in the Church. When we are one as a family, we can do great things for God; or rather, he can do great things in us and through us.

It is for this reason that I believe the Holy Spirit is calling me to lead us in a process of crafting a vision for our immediate future as a diocese. In a sense, our task is to simply discern what God wants us to do, right here, right now, and then act together.

A 🎵 from the Líturgy/Musíc Office



Quickly reading this Sunday's scriptures may give us the idea that they are about feeding people. However, if we read slowly and let the words sink into our heart and soul we see that they

are of a deeper subject.


The **First Reading** (2 Kings 4:4244) is the continuation of the story of the early Prophet Elisha (not Elijah, his mentor), who was sent by God to battle the evils of the Jewish monarchy (circa 800 B.C.). Elisha was given the Spirit's gift of miracles; not for his own use, but to show the power and goodness of God. He is feeding 100 people with 20 loaves of bread. What we and the people of Elisha's day should have seen is that God provides for His people who call on Him in their need.

The **Responsorial Psalm** (145:10-18) recognizes the goodness of God and praises Him for His goodness and divine providence, but this is not easy, especially if we only look to God for material needs. The last line of this psalm gives us the right direction: "The Lord is near to all who call upon Him – in truth." Truth, in this context, means a sincere awareness of who God is.

The **Second Reading** is from St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians (4:1-6). Here Paul sums up the entire message of today's readings. If upon our knowledge and acceptance of Jesus Christ as our Lord and our God, we must let His light shine through our deeds and our speech. If we believe that God is within us and within each baptized Christian, then we must love each other as a reflection of God within us.

The **Gospel** Reading (Mark 6:1-15) is the familiar story of Jesus feeding approximately 5,000 people through the multiplication of five loaves of bread. Most people see the magnitude and uniqueness of this miracle but fail to see what is most important – that God provides for His people! They fail to see that God is in their midst in the person of Jesus Christ who could and would provide much more than a meal. They also fail to let the essence of the miracle sink into their heart and soul.

We need to reconsider our own actions in this regard: When we are in need, do we go to God in prayer? When we receive Holy Communion, do we spend a moment to thank our Lord and God for His goodness and many blessings, or, do we rush out of church without the least thought of a thanksgiving? Further, even if we do make an act of thanksgiving, do we then carry that out and reflect it to others? This really is something to think about during your Prayer Time.

The past two weeks I wrote about two ministries in which I participate and which are dear to my heart. For the next several weeks I will be offering information about my primary ministry at St. James, serving as the Director of Christian Initiation.

I became the Director of Christian Initiation July 1, 1997., after myself becoming a Catholic in 1995. The following 2 years I served as a team member under the direction of Ann Tucker. I must confess. I wasn't sure that I was ready for the responsibility of leading the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) but said ves when presented with the opportunity. I had been a teacher for many years and thought this ministry was simply a new teaching challenge. I soon discovered that my concept and ideas were far from accurate. Although I attended a week-long Beginnings and Bevond retreat (designed as formation for RCIA ministers) I still attempted to use an educational model for catechesis. As you will see over the next few weeks, conversion and catechesis is not simply an experience in catholic education but rather a journey of love with life changing consequences and responsibilities.

Christian initiation isn't about studying, testing and graduation; it is an experience of living in intimate union with Christ Jesus and trying to follow in his footsteps. It is all about trusting and freely surrendering our lives to Him. Conversion is about discovering the graces which God provides, so that we as individuals and community can proclaim His Kingdom, not simply with words but with the actions and living of our every day, ordinary lives. Becoming a Catholic and living in His light is about embracing those in need, without a voice, forgotten, alone, or abandoned by our society. Being Catholic requires a holistic faith, leaving a dichotomous life (secular vs sacred) behind and joining every aspect of who we are, where we work, how we function in society, the way we protect God's creation, and how we serve others, together into the essence and center of our humanity. Catholicism is founded and rooted in human identity. To become a disciple of Jesus is to begin and live each day in gratitude and thanksgiving for everything He provides, while humbling serving the one we call Lord.



I know that it's still July, but I can tell from the shelves at the stores that we are getting geared up for Back To School season. Which naturally brings stressed-out emails and calls from par-



ents who are worried that somehow they missed the signup window for RE. Let me lay that fear to rest – we don't begin registrations until next month!

This year we will put the registration forms out on the table in the narthex and up on the parish website during the first weekend of August 4/5. We'll start staffing the registration table the following weekend and will have someone there before after the Masses throughout the month of August.

Classes begin September 9th and 12th and run until the final weekend in April of 2019. Fees remain the same as last year at \$55 for one child, \$100 for two, and no more than \$125 per family. That fee schedule includes the middle school grades too; you can just write one check for both programs.

Payment of fees is due at registration unless you contact the RE or Youth office directly to arrange a payment schedule, which we are happy to do. While we would love to be able to take debit card payments, we do not have that capability yet, so it's cash or check only. You can print off the forms on the website, but since we can't process electronic payments, you'll need to print the form off and either bring it in or mail it in with your payment.

You have your choice of either the Sunday morning session (9 to 10:30 am, preschool 3 years old by 8/1/19 through fifth grade) or Wednesday evening session (6:30 to 8:00 pm, first through fifth, sixth through eighth only – there is no Pre-K and Kindergarten on Wednesday nights). However, that choice is limited by class size and available space, so my advice would be to register EARLY to insure that your child gets the spot that you need.

What does it mean to tithe?

At St. James School, parents can either fulfill a tithe yearly, or pay tuition costs directly to the school. Here is an explanation of how tithing for education at St. James works.

- Registered family at St. James Church (your family name will be in the church directory if you are registered and you will have an envelope number)
- Tithe regularly (contribute set amount you determine on a pledge card submitted to the church office by use of envelopes or automatic withdrawal from account). This pledge is required to be fulfilled each year as our church budget relies on it. Pledge year runs January 1 - December 31.
- Active parishioners attend Sunday Mass weekly, receive Sacraments regularly.
