Most of us need a reminder – or two - so that we don't forget the important things. This is one of those important things we don't want you to forget.


The *Stewardship of Treasure* (2019 tithe) and *New Church Fund 2019* appeals are so important to our parish. If you have not done so already, we invite you most sincerely to return you pledge cards next weekend.



There are three pots you are asked to contribute towards:

- 1. Stewardship of Treasure
 - we suggest 5% of your gross income.
- 2. New Church Fund 2019
 - we suggest 4% of your gross income.
- **3. Annual Catholic Appeal (Diocese)** - we suggest 1% of your gross income.

This last appeal was made to all families in the diocese. You can mail the diocesan pledge directly to them or, if you like, you can put it into our pledge boxes and we will send it to the chancery for you. Giving back to God, called a tithe, is 10% of your gross income.



Stewardship of Talent

THIS MONTH WE FOCUS ON OUR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION MINISTRY By Cecilia Richardson–Director of Religious Education

My family and I moved to Liberty in the late fall of 1990. We were excited and a bit anxious to start our new life in this small town. We started attending Mass at St James and were just blown away by the

music and I grew to depend on that weekly experience as my family dealt with the challenges of not one but eventually three new additions to our family. It's hard for newcomers to Liberty to visualize, but when we moved here, there was nothing on the I-35 side but a McDonald's and a little gas station. The bridge over I-35 was governed by a single stop sign, and that was more than enough to handle what little traffic there was. That was true for St James as well. No matter what Mass you attended, there were always plenty of seats. No one sat in the Narthex. When I enrolled my oldest daughter in Religious Education, it was only offered on Sunday morning with just a tiny fraction of the numbers of students that we have now! We had no preschool classes, and kindergarten was a new thing for St James RE.

Now almost thirty years later, everything has changed. Liberty's population expanded dramatically and with that growth came both more and less – more people, less places for people to sit, more students, less small classes, more families, less small-town feel. St James has worked hard to bridge those gaps, to make people feel welcomed and needed, but it's hard to do when you have outgrown your space. It's hard to have new programs or events when there isn't room enough for what we currently offer.

The Religious Education (RE) program is a good example of that. When my predecessor took over the program, it was run from the trunk of a volunteer's car. Fran Riley took it out of the trunk, made it an organized, well-staffed classroom program. When I started in 2001, it was clear that we had outgrown a one-timeslot offering so we added the Wednesday night session. After a while, we started to realize that the traditional, classroom model of RE was not meeting the

needs of our families and their hectic lives. So we rewrote the program, changing the focus from classroom/textbook learning to one that was more familycentered. We still have classroom instruction, but we supplement that with home assignments, with Family Days, with Mass Transit cards that help families integrate their Sunday Mass experience with the curriculum. We begin every session with a large-group opening prayer service. We use monthly themes that correspond with the Liberty Schools' character trait of the month but pair that trait with a saint for the month.

This year we are opening with stories taken from general children's literature but which feature the character trait of the saint we are studying. We do this so that our students can see that their faith exists in all aspects of their life, not just here at church. So, for example, the story <u>Mixed</u> was used to talk about respect for those who differ from us and illustrates our saint of the month, St Peter Claver and his work with the African slaves in South America. We want our students to see their world through Catholic eyes.

We are excited to have a new worship space with all the joys and frustrations that will bring. We'll have to adjust to the luxury of having plenty of seats to go around, but also adjust to the changes that will come with that new space. There will be new faces who come to take a peek and hopefully stick around to be a part of our community, which means that we'll have to work to be welcoming to these new friends-wehaven't-met-yet. As someone who remembers very well what it was like to be the new kid here. I know that St James will meet that challenge. I may joke that we should have been named Our Lady of Perpetual Procrastination – because boy, do we hate to get our paperwork in on time! - but the reality is that St James himself would be proud of how well we accept new faces and new families. I can't wait to see what the next 20 years have in store for us!
