From the Pastor's Pen

With another turn of the page we've entered into the month of October. The brisk nip in the air is one reminder that time is marching on and we are still around to witness yet another day. During this month of October, we also celebrate and observe Respect Life Month. The annual Respect Life Program is a year-round, nationwide effort to help Catholics understand, value, and become engaged with building a culture that cherishes every human life.

Over the years, different terms have been connected with Respect Life, focusing on cherishing life from conception to natural death. Pro-life, pro-peace have joined in the talk about ending abortion and the death penalty, along with dealing with restorative justice and the justice system while still recognizing the dignity of the human person.

Growing up on the farm, I learned to respect life in many different ways. As I watched a calf being born, it was awesome seeing new life coming into the world. When it happened naturally with no assistance, it was indeed a miracle. However, when we had to assist it was a whole different story. My dad taught me some of the warning signs to look out for and how to better the situation. His one comment that always stuck with me was to be looking ahead to prevent anything worse to happen. If we didn't' do something correctly it risked losing the life of the calf and possibly the cow. It was far easier to try to prevent then it was to try to correct or fix later.

That is one thing that still sticks with me today. Even during my studies in Chicago, I volunteered at Eight Day Center. One of their missions was to work for systemic change. It's really easy to identify the problems after the fact and then be forced to deal with them. What about working to make changes on the other side, the beginning, so that the negative results don't happen. What would it take to make changes so that no one was arrested or jailed? What would it take to make changes so that there were not unwanted pregnancy? What would it take to make changes so that no one ever got sick? Some things we can work for change, others are part of life.

The gift of life is precious to each one of us. May we cherish it each and every day.

Someone is Watching and Wondering



October is an interesting month; a time of struggle between summer and winter. Like so many Octobers before I'm sure this month will have cool crisp fall days, the last warm summer days, and perhaps snow may fall

toward the end of the month. In the United States October also has become a time of intense division and struggle. One cannot turn on the television, radio or computer without a political ad popping up. Our mailboxes are full of flyers, our streets and lawn are decorated with "Vote For" signs, and we, as citizens, are asked to choose who we believe will best serve the common good as elected officials. Like nature, we struggle!

The past several weeks I have been reading about the commonalities (rather than the differences) between Judaism, Islam, and Christianity. I must admit I have been pleasantly surprised. I think most people are aware that the God of Abraham is the center from which these three faith traditions have evolved. It is also true that each tradition emphasizes right worship, prayer, care of creation, and surrender to God's will. There is one similarity, however, that I'm not sure is readily obvious; that is "struggle" or the Arabic word "jihad." Just as Mother Nature seems to struggle in the Fall, so we too struggle to follow God, into a life where God is first/central, from which all else emanates. Our lives are not about power, wealth, pleasure, or honor. Our lives are about loving and serving God and one another.

I don't think I have been different from most people who equated the word jihad with violence, terrorism, and evil. However, in Muhammad's writings there is lesser jihad and greater jihad. Lesser jihad is best understood as necessary defense or just war. As in Catholic teaching there are strict parameters in Islam to define just war such as protecting noncombatants and forbidding the use of poisonous weapons. Though lesser jihad may be necessary at times, Muhammad taught that greater jihad was the most significant. He described greater jihad as humanity's inner struggles to obey God's will, to control selfish passions, to praise Him and serve His creation. In Islam, jihad includes even the smallest, least significant action, so long as it represents a genuine effort, every struggle and sacrifice made "in the way of God" (Responses to 101 Questions on Islam, J. Renard). Such struggles include caring for the sick and elderly, reaching out to feed the hungry, clothing the poor, and forgiving those who hate and persecute. As my reading progresses I continue to be amazed by the similarities, especially as I recognize my personal struggles. I still believe all things are possible with God and continue to ask for His guidance and strength.



Father Thomas Albers, C.PP.S.

May 4, 1940 - September 30, 2018



The Rev. Thomas L. Albers, C.PP.S., 78, a member of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, Kansas City Province, died September 30, 2018 at St. Rita Hospital in Lima, Ohio following a lengthy illness. Fr. Tom served as pastor of our St. James Parish from 2007 - 2011.

Fr. Tom was born on May 4,1940 in Minster, OH. Following eight years of grade school, he entered the Society of the Precious Blood upon enrollment at Brunnerdale Seminary in Canton, OH. After two years of study at St. Joseph College in Rensselaer, IN, from 1958 to 1960, Fr. Tom began his novitiate year at the end of which he was incorporated into the Society on August 15, 1961. Several weeks later he began six years of philosophy and theology studies at St. Charles Seminary in Carthagena, OH. He was definitively incorporated on August 15, 1964 and ordained a priest on June 3, 1967 at St. Charles Seminary by Bishop Edward McCarthy.

Following ordination, Fr. Tom was the summer assistant at St. Joseph Parish in Amery, WI. In September, he began several months of service as supply chaplain at St. Bernard Hospital in Chicago, IL, and then in December was appointed associate chaplain at Little Company of Mary Hospital in Evergreen Park, IL, where he served until July 1969.

He then began a year-long intensive Catholic Chaplaincy Training Program at the National Center for Mental Health Service, Training, and Research at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Washington, D.C., followed by a year of advanced clinical pastoral education at Anna State Hospital in Anna, IL.

Following his year in Anna, Fr. Tom spent the next 13 years in hospital ministry. During this time, in 1983, he served a one-year term as president of the National Catholic Hospital Chaplains Association, and was also elected to the Provincial Council in the role of vice-provincial for a four-year term. From 1984 to 1987, he served as director of the College Formation Program for the Province and in 1987, was elected provincial director of the Kansas City Province.

Following eight years as provincial director, Fr. Tom began 18 years of service as a pastor in parishes in Missouri: St. Patrick and Sacred Heart, Sedalia; St. Ann, Warsaw; Sts. Peter and Paul, Cole Camp; St. James, Liberty; and St. Mary Church, Nevada. In 2013, he retired to St. Charles Center in Carthagena, Ohio, where he resided until his death.

A Memorial Service for Fr. Tom will be held here on Tuesday, October 23 at 6:00pm



Sacrament Preparation First Reconciliation Preparation

If you missed the parent meetings last week, you will need to contact the RE office right away to get

on the list for the make up meeting. Just to recap the requirements to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, a child must be:



- At least 7 years old
- In at least the 2nd grade
- Have completed at least one year prior faith formation in either a Catholic school, a parish Religious Education program or a qualified program of home-study.

If your child does not meet those 3 requirements, then you would begin the preparation process next year and use this year to complete the basics. These requirements are not meant to be a burden for a child and his/her family, but to make the process easier for all involved.
