From the Pastor's Pen

This past Wednesday we began the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday. 

Someone is Watching and Wondering




I don't know why this is true but the older I become, the faster time seems to pass. Already we are into the second week of March. Once again Daylight Saving Time is upon us, coinciding with the first Sunday of Lent. This past Wednesday we received ashes and heard "Repent and believe in the Gospel," and I'm sure you have already thought about or maybe already began the journey of what to give up for Lent. Instead of that all too familiar path of giving up, I would like to challenge you to name the following: What do you desire for Lent? I'm not asking what you want, such as you might be asked for your birthday, anniversary, or Christmas gift. No I'm asking to name your deepest desire.

Perhaps this quote from Richard Rohr (*Wondrous Encounters—Scripture for Lent*) may help place your thinking on a different level: "You are the desiring of God. God desires through you and longs for Life and Love through you and in you." If this is God's desire for each of His children, I will again ask: What is your desire? Is it possible to truly desire anything that God has not already desired for you? Is it possible to desire what you do not know? Is your desire hidden, that desire that brings conversion and a fuller life in and relationship with Christ? The ashes you received were created from the burnt palms of last Palm Sunday, yet signing with those ashes is the mark of new beginnings.

Although the question to name what I desire for Lent has been on my mind for some time, I must confess I experienced great difficulty in separating my wants from a deep desire to bring about a new relationship with and life in Christ. I want to be healthy, to continue my work with the catechumenate, to have a stronger prayer life, to be more patient, to accept others, to let go of past hurts, and to understand my place in the world. I know God has given me tools to attain most of these wants, even though I often require pushing and prodding. However, as I searched that dark place within I discovered a deep desire for peace. A peace I cannot find with trusting in His Love and sincerely surrendering to Him. To begin finding this peace, I must invite the Holy Spirit to take away the darkness of my insecurities and which blocks HIS desire for me.

Stewardship of Treasure

Bearing the Mark of Jesus - Evangelize

"for, if you confess* with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved." Romans 10:9-10

Do I confess with my mouth that I believe Jesus is Lord? I do believe in my heart that Christ suffered for me. I do believe that God raised Jesus from the dead to save me. That suffering is a personal thing. an emotional thing. We must believe and confess to be good stewards. Mr. Welliver poses the guestion in his Stewardship book, "what ways do you bear witness to the role Jesus Christ plays in your life?" If we do not bear witness, what kind of steward are we? Do we hide behind the words of Ash Wednesday, ("hypocrites showing off their fasting, prayers, and almsgiving") allowing ourselves to justify NOT openly bearing witness?

This question makes me think. Do I give thanks for my meal when I am out in public? Do I wear a cross necklace on the outside of my shirt? Do I leave my ashes on my forehead when I go back to work? Are these things something done "to show others" as the hypocrites or are they done because I believe in my heart and confess with my mouth? This seems like such a fine line. A line that can bend to my needs at the time. I can think of times when out of habit I have crossed myself in public or said grace in a restaurant and then thought, did others see me do that? Did I just "show" in public? Although when our children were young, we always said grace wherever we were. I wanted them to always thank God for what we were given no matter where we were. So now contemplating those memories – Show or evangelization? Bearing witness and showing off are two different things. Personally, I hope my children or I never stop saving grace, or making the sign of the cross - public or private. I hope it is a small sign of the belief in our hearts

This week, I ask you to think about the mark of Jesus that you bear. What is one additional way you can bear witness to the role Jesus plays in your life?

Prayer

Fasting

Almsgiving

The three traditional pillars of Lenten observance are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The key to renewed appropriation of these practices is to see their link to baptismal renewal.

Prayer: More time given to prayer during Lent should draw us closer to the Lord. We might pray especially for the grace to live out our baptismal promises more fully. We might pray for the elect who will be baptized at Easter and support their conversion journey by our prayer. We might pray for all those who will celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation with us during Lent that they will be truly renewed in their baptismal commitment.

Fasting: Fasting is one of the most ancient practices linked to Lent. In fact, the paschal fast predates Lent as we know it. The early Church fasted intensely for two days before the celebration of the Easter Vigil. This fast was later extended and became a 40-day period of fasting leading up to Easter. Vatican II called us to renew the observance of the ancient paschal fast: "...let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with uplifted and clear mind." (Liturgy, # 110).

Fasting is more than a means of developing self-control. It is often an aid to prayer, as the pangs of hunger remind us of our hunger for God. Fasting should be linked to our concern for those who are forced to fast by their poverty, those who suffer from the injustices of our economic and political structures, those who are in need for any reason. Fasting can help us realize the suffering that so many people in our world experience every day, and it should lead us to greater efforts to alleviate that suffering.

Abstaining from meat traditionally also linked us to the poor, who could seldom afford meat for their meals. It can do the same today if we remember the purpose of abstinence and embrace it as a spiritual link to those whose diets are sparse and simple. That should be the goal we set for ourselves – a sparse and simple meal. Avoiding meat while eating lobster misses the whole point!

Almsgiving: It should be obvious at this point that almsgiving, the third traditional pillar, is linked to our baptismal commitment in the same way. It is a sign of our care for those in need and an expression of our gratitude for all that God has given to us. Works of charity and the promotion of justice are integral elements of the Christian way of life we began when we were baptized.

A Special Pilgrimage Opportunity

The incorrupt heart of St. John Vianney, Patron of Parish Priests and Seminarians, will be displayed for public veneration on Tuesday March 19, 2019 in the Cathedral of St. Joseph at 519 N. 10th St., St. Joseph, Missouri. Public veneration will begin following the 8am Holy Mass. The Cathedral will remain open throughout the day. At 5:30pm Solemn Vespers will be celebrated with Bishop Johnston presiding. Public veneration will conclude at 8pm. All parishes and parishioners throughout the diocese are invited to make a pilgrimage to the Cathedral of St. Joseph for this event.

This is a golden opportunity for all God's people to come together during the Diocesan Holy Year and pray for the renewal of our local Church. In addition, it's a graced moment to pray for priests and seminarians, asking the good God to raise up vocations to the priesthood and to rekindle the love of Jesus Crucified in the hearts of those already ordained.

Children's Choir



Instead of having your children give up something this Lent, consider whether they might benefit from the weekly commitment and service involved in participating in Children's Choir.

Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and alms-giving. Saturday morning practices (10-11:15 am) and participating in Masses during Lent, Holy Week and Easter is a great alternative to giving up chocolate for Lent.

like their Bus Stop ministry and their new thrift store. St James was built in 1906 and has always been a center of outreach to the Troost corridor. Situated as they are right on top of the major cross-town bus routes, they have a unique ability to reach people from a wide area in the city.

And with our unique partnership, and our shared pastor (yay Fr Mike!) we have the added benefit of knowing that our efforts will pay off in the long term.

Have You Picked Up Your Rice Bowl Yet?



Through almsgiving, we encounter our brothers and sisters around the world, asking what we can give up so that others might have life to the fullest.

More than 40 years ago, Catholics in the United States wanted to respond to

famine in Africa. Could people who were hungry and starving be helped through Lenten prayers, fasting and almsgiving? The answer was yes — and the help came in the form of a small cardboard box, marking the beginning of "Operation Rice Bowl" in 1975.

In its first 40 years, more than \$250 million has been given through CRS Rice Bowl to support programs that prevent hunger and poverty around the world. Of that, \$62.5 million went to programs in the U.S. through local dioceses and \$187.5 million went to CRS programs overseas.

Each year CRS Rice Bowl funds are directed to between 40 and 45 countries where CRS operates humanitarian response and development programs.

Lenten alms go to alleviate hunger and poverty in communities overseas and in the U.S.: seventy-five percent of gifts support CRS' humanitarian programs around the world. 25 percent of gifts remain in each U.S. diocese where they are given to hunger and poverty alleviation efforts in those communities.

We Say Thank You, Thank You, Thank You


