

From the Pastor's Pen

And the adventure begins!!! On Monday morning, July 1st, I headed north on I-35 and arrived a couple hours later at St. Mary's in Centerville, and was faced with the big decision, "Where do I begin?" I'm here, my stuff is here, my boxes are here and so now what? After a warm greeting from Fr. Bill Hubmann, previous pastor, and a few last minute transition things, he handed me the keys to the kingdom and loaded a few more things and departed.

He chased it into the living room under a chair and then under a hutch. He finally caught it and carried it outside. As he's telling me all this, all I could do was to cover my face and laugh. I couldn't stop laughing picturing him chasing that snake. All he could figure out is that it came in with the plant and as it warmed up overnight woke up and began to explore. Glad it was him and not me that found it!

Otherwise, it has been a great week getting settled in and getting to know names and faces. I do miss all of you, but am also looking forward to being here and serving as Pastor. I look forward to the opportunity to share my story as well as getting to hear stories of the parishioners and the community. One of the things I have learned in my few short 18 years of ordained ministry is that when you go to a new place, you gotta start almost all over again. I can't pick up what I've done and accomplished at the previous place and just plug it into the new place. It's not totally starting over, but it is starting afresh and learning the routines and the people and figuring out what works and what doesn't and how best we continue to grow the parish and welcome one another.

On July 15th, I will celebrate yet another birthday. I will be 23 and two/halves on each leg. (You do the math.) I will be taking some vacation time for myself from July 9-17 and then on Sunday, July 21st, we will welcome Bishop Zinkula, of Davenport, for Installation of Pastor.



Reflection


Sometimes those who need to be helped want help on their own terms. But today's gospel is a reminder that to those in the ditch, help may come from the most unforeseen or even unimaginable people. When we place limitations on even such things as who might lend us help or assistance, we might not be open to the mercy of God, which is extended in a variety of ways.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan we are not told if the victim is conscious, but if he was we can imagine his hope and excitement on seeing first a priest and then a Levite coming toward him on the road. We can also imagine his crushing disappointment as these men turned away from him. Being neglected by his own people, what must the victim's thoughts have been when he spied the Samaritan coming toward him? Did he still have hope or was he fearful? How would you feel if you saw your enemy coming toward you while you lay helplessly in a ditch? Jesus tells a parable to expand our vision of "neighbor". Both the Samaritan and the robbers' victim must look past external labels to recognize the neighbor within each other.

Prayer

Gracious God, in Jesus, you show us who our neighbor is. Yet we often try to limit your mercy. Teach us to love you fully by loving our neighbors as ourselves. I will praise the name of God in song, and I will glorify God with thanksgiving, Amen.

Someone is Watching and Wondering



St. Thrérèse of Lisieux was a woman of prayer who stated: "For me, prayer is a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy." St. John Damascene wrote "Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God" (CCC: 2559), yet such basic ideas of prayer seem to be lost in much of our understanding. For example, in RCIA gatherings I am frequently asked, "When are you going to teach the Catholic Prayers?"

Our Church teaches that humility is the foundation of prayer, and that prayer is a covenant between God and humanity. "Whether prayer is expressed in words or gestures, it is the whole person who prays." Scripture may speak of the soul or spirit as the source of prayer, yet more often we read that it is the heart that prays. "If our heart is far from God, the words of the prayer are in vain" (CCC: 2562). The catechism continues "The heart is the dwelling-place where I Am, where I live. . . the heart is our hidden center, beyond the grasp of our reason and of others; only the Spirit of God can fathom the human heart and know it fully. The heart is the place of decision, deeper than our psychic drives. It is the place of truth, where we choose life or death. It is the place of encounter, because as an image of God we live in relation: it is the place of covenant."

For me these words and the picture above beautifully express the foundation on which our prayer life must be built. We cannot simply memorize and recite formulaic prayers. Rather prayer requires time to sit in God's presence, to close out all distractions, to open our minds to receive His love, and to bare our hearts for His healing and peace. In reality, prayer is an action of God which we willing receive. Prayer is a living relationship which requires nurturing and patience. It is communion with the Father, through Christ and with the Holy Spirit. Prayer is our conversation with the Trinity, the union of our spirits with God. Prayer is essential for living as Christians because without this communion with God we lose our grounding and live hopelessly searching for what only God can provide, love, mercy, peace, joy and hope. Prayer is from our hearts not our memory.

I was fortunate to be able to attend Rebecca's graduation last Monday, and see her move on to the

next phase of her life. She's done really well in her time at Hillcrest and will spend 4 months in transitional housing before she will move out completely on her own. There were repre-



sentatives from the church sponsors of the other 5 graduates, including our friends over at St Pius. It was very heartwarming to hear the stories of the graduates and see how hard they have worked and how much they have learned. I was surprised to hear from several graduates that their time at Hillcrest had brought their family closer and given them the gift of time spent together that they wouldn't have had.

I asked Rebecca if there was anything she wanted our families to know about her time there. She said that the first night (and even the whole first week) was really hard. Change is always challenging, but this change is drastic, which can lead to feeling very alone and overwhelmed. She said the homemade brownies touched her deeply - knowing that someone had made brownies just for her helped to lift her spirits and made her feel like she was home and had hope for her future that she hadn't had in a long time. We always leave a small bowl of chocolate candies on that gorgeous dinette table (that was actually the first thing she asked me – what was the story behind that beautiful table?!) She said the chocolates helped get her through the first week. but she was most grateful for the brownies.

Such a small and simple thing. Who'd have thought that a little pan of brownies could make such a huge impact in someone's life? What you all do for the residents in our apartment makes a real difference – you ARE the hands and feet of Christ in this world.

<u>Second Grade:</u> "Joy in the Journey"

As we journey through second grade, students are engaged in learning experiences that will help shape who they will become. We go through the sacraments of Reconciliation and First Communion, and gain a better understanding of our faith. This culminates in our May Crowning celebration!

Our study trip through the Zoo ED program leads us to different destinations around the world and promotes the cross-curriculum of math, literacy, social studies, and science in the activities offered.

As the children become independent readers, they focus on by previewing and predicting before reading, searching for relevant information during reading, and reflecting on learning after reading. They learn mathematical concepts using manipulatives, games, technology, and other activities to gain an understanding. They gain an understanding of what it takes to be a functioning community. They create a town using the concepts in our social studies units and present their businesses to the other grades. Through the OLWEUS (Bullying Prevention Program) program, they learn to respect themselves and others.
